Dear Stakeholders, I hope this special budget issue of our school newsletter finds you enjoying the long-awaited sunshine and all the spring season has to offer. For school districts, spring is a time to focus on finishing our school year strong while at the same time preparing for the upcoming school year. On May 21, 2024, DCS residents will have an opportunity to vote on a \$12,360,648 proposed budget for the 2024-2025 school year. It is important for us that you know that we value transparency and accountability, as every dollar spent directly impacts the quality of education we provide to our students. With that in mind, we want to take this opportunity to update you on the proposed budget for the 2024-25 School Year and summarize some of what you will find on the next few pages.

Budget Overview: This coming year's budget is an increase of \$187,270 (1.54%) over the 2023-24 school year. With a proposed tax levy of 3.04%, a simple majority is required for budget approval. The voters will also consider a Bus Proposition and two valuable local propositions that run through the school budget: the Library Contribution Proposition, and the Recreation Youth Program Proposition. I hope that you will see the 1.5% budget increase as evidence that the district is working hard to be efficient and to steward the school finances well in the face of high inflation, increases in contractual obligations, and rising energy and facilities costs.

The 2024-2025 budget demonstrates wise, conservative fiscal practices, while also being carefully crafted to address the diverse needs of our students, staff, and facilities. Here's a brief overview:

- 1. Prioritizing Education: The core of our budget (72.49%) remains dedicated to enhancing educational experiences. This includes investments in curriculum development, instructional resources, and professional development opportunities for our educators.
- 2. Supporting Student Success: We are committed to providing a nurturing environment where every student can thrive. Our budget allocates funds for academic support services, extracurricular activities, and programs aimed at promoting student well-being and success.
- **3. Maintaining Facilities:** Our school buildings are more than just structures; they are the heart of our community. We have allocated funds for ongoing maintenance, repairs,

and facility upgrades to ensure safe and conducive learning environments for our students and staff.

Challenges and Opportunities: While we strive to make the most of our financial resources, it's essential to acknowledge the challenges we face and the opportunities that lie ahead.

- 1. State Funding: Like many rural school districts, we continue to grapple with fluctuations in state funding. While we advocate for equitable funding, we must also explore alternative revenue streams and cost-saving measures to mitigate the impact of budgetary constraints and decreases in enrollment.
- 2. Community Engagement: Your input and support are invaluable as we navigate budgetary decisions. We encourage open dialogue and collaboration to ensure that our budget aligns with the priorities and values of our community.
- **3. Grant Opportunities:** We are actively pursuing grant opportunities to supplement our budget and fund special projects and initiatives. By leveraging external resources, we can expand educational offerings and enhance the overall learning experience for our students.

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2024-25 by the qualified voters of the DeRuyter Central school district, Madison County, New York, will be held in the lobby by the big gym DeRuyter Central School in said district on Tuesday, May 21, 2024 between the hours of 12:00pm and 9:00pm prevailing time in the DeRuyter Central School, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by paper ballot voting ballot.

SUMMARY OF RESOLUTIONS -

Proposition 1 2024-25 School Budget: Shall the Board of Education adopt a budget for the DeRuyter Central School District in the amount of \$12,360,748 for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2024?

Proposition 2 Bus Proposition: Shall the Board of Education of the DeRuyter Central School District be authorized to purchase and finance one (1) 36-passenger wheelchair school bus and one (1) 48-passenger school bus, including necessary furnishings, fixtures, and equipment, and all other costs incidental thereto, and expend a total sum not to exceed \$348,000, which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and said amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of said School District and collected in annual installments as provided by Section 416 of the Education Law; and, in anticipation of such tax, obligations of said School District, in the principal amount not to exceed \$348,000, shall be issued.

Proposition 3 Library Contribution: Shall the annual appropriation for the DeRuyter Free Library within the DeRuyter Central School District be increased from its current level of \$41,187 per year to \$41,404 per year, such sum to be raised by levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the District?

Proposition 4 Recreation Youth Program: Shall the Board of Education of the DeRuyter Central School District be authorized to expend \$20,000 for the district-wide recreation program administered by the Village of DeRuyter for the 2024-2025 school year, such sum to be raised by levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the District?

Tax Levy Impact The impact of approving all 4 propositions would be an increase to the tax levy of 3.04% which is our tax cap. Due to assessment (Town control) and equalization (State control), we are not able to calculate the exact impact to each individual town at this time.

PROPOSITION 3 DETAIL-

DeRuyter Free Library

This year's proposed budget represents an increase of \$217 (1.06%) and is below the Library's tax cap limit for 2024. This year's budget continues long-standing efforts by the Board to minimize the impact of any increases on community residents. The DeRuyter Free Library provides many programs, services, and materials for our community. In 2023 we offered 92 programs for people of all ages, with program attendance of 1,056 people. In addition to programming, many community members rely on the library for printing, faxing, general computer, and WIFI use. In 2023, we had 520 computer sessions and 355 WIFI sessions. We offer a variety of circulating materials for check-out, including books, magazines, audiobooks, DVDs, puzzles, board games, eBooks, eMagazines, and eAudiobooks. In 2023, we checked out 13,111 items to patrons. In addition to physical items, 1,961 items were checked out digitally through our eReading app.

Our communities have a long history of supporting the DeRuyter Free Library. The mission of the DeRuyter Free Library is to serve as a resource for the education, enjoyment, and cultural enrichment of the entire community served by the DeRuyter Central School District. We are grateful for the public's trust, and pledge our best stewardship of that continuing support. The library support proposition enables us to continue providing much-needed services to the DeRuyter Central School District area. The library strives to improve the quality of life of area residents by promoting a love of reading and an awareness of books and other materials as a means of satisfying the diverse needs and interests of the community it serves. If there are any questions, comments, or concerns, we invite area residents to contact Library Board members, or stop into the library to review the budget and annual report materials. We regularly recruit and welcome volunteers, and Board members as openings occur, all positions being open to all community members. All are welcome at our monthly Board meetings.

PROPOSITION 4 DETAIL-

Village of DeRuyter Recreation Youth Program

For over 60 years, the Village of DeRuyter has offered recreational opportunities for the youth that live within the DeRuyter School District. Last summer, we were able to get in contact with the Cortland Youth Bureau to offer three weeks of swimming lessons at a pool in Cortland. We are planning to continue this contract again this summer. We were able to run successful spring and summer baseball programs again, a very well attended soccer program, and joined the John Tobin league for basketball during the winter months with three teams! All of this was possible with \$17,500.

The new soccer and softball field at the fairgrounds are receiving some finishing touches, such as bleachers donated by the school and a new storage shed closer to the field (to be installed Spring 2024). The addition of these fields has helped to continue to build our Community Recreation program, giving more opportunities for the youth of DeRuyter.

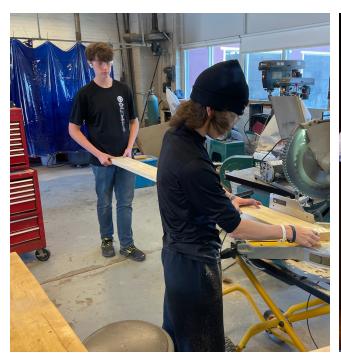

Also included are pupil services such as health, guidance, library, co-curricular, athletics, and transportation. Associated employee benefit expenses, legal, and community service expenses are also included.

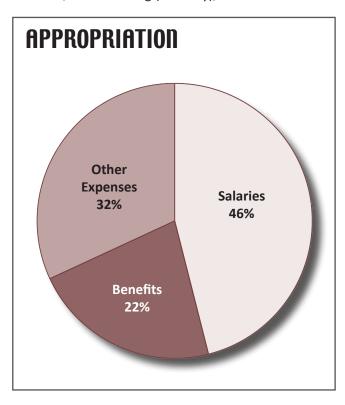

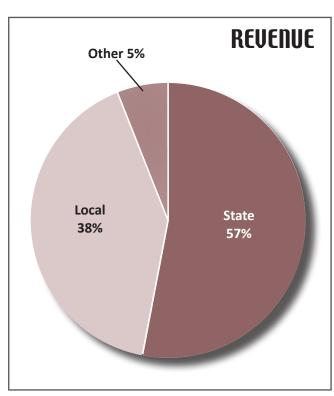

It was a great opportunity to learn more about our state's ancient environment and the species that once inhabited it.

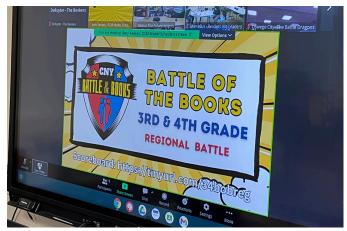
DeRuyter Builds

Battle of the Books



Battle of the Books is a program where students read a set of eight books, then compete in "battles" where they have to identify the title and author of a book based on details from the book. Each school district can have one team per grade-band compete via Zoom with other schools in the Regional Battle. DeRuyter has had teams competing at multiple grade bands each year since OCM BOCES began the program in 2019. The top two teams in each Regional Battle go on to compete against teams from other BOCES regions.

This year our first and second graders enjoyed a close review of the books during library time. Two rounds of in-school competition narrowed down the field to our team of four, with one alternate. After holding first place for several rounds, they tied for third place in the Regional Battle on April 2nd. Third, fourth, fifth and sixth were run as after school enrichment clubs and the seventh and eighth teams met during school hours. The final Regional Battles will be April 12th. Thank you to all of the students, coaches (Jenn Jones, Amanda Ladd, Jennifer Hull, and Kate Meigs), and families for making Battle of the Books a success this year. Next year's reading lists will be shared after the Super Regional Battles.

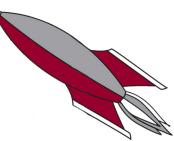
